## ARDRAW: A Brief History

- A successor research grant program to the Disability Determination Process (DDP) Small Grant Program
  - Completed projects: <https://ardraw.policyresearchinc.org/completed-projects/>
- The goals of ARDRAW
  - To provide new analysis of work, rehabilitation, and disability issues, in suggested research areas
  - To provide experience in conducting funded, independent research projects
  - To promote continued research in the area of disability
- This is the fourth ARDRAW cohort

## ARDRAW Program Focus

- Analysis of work, rehabilitation, and disability
- Focus on SSA's employment programs, specifically rehabilitation, work and SSA's disability programs
- Some suggested areas:
  - Characteristics of SSA beneficiaries, such as age and job characteristics
  - Workplace accommodations and benefits
  - Impact of policy changes on individuals' ability to work
  - Vocational and other services used by SSA beneficiaries

## ARDRAW Program Eligibility Criteria

- Full or part-time graduate student in an accredited program at the time of award (Fall semester 2020)
- Academic emphasis on employment, rehabilitation, disability, public health, economics, social work, occupational medicine, etc.
- U.S. citizen or non-citizen national
- University faculty mentor committed to assist in research
- Employees of SSA or those receiving funds from other federal sources are not eligible

## ARDRAW Grant Program Expectations

- Complete application packet submitted online by February 28, 2020
- Students and faculty mentors participate on quarterly calls
- Submit deliverables in a timely fashion
  - Work Plan – June 5, 2020
  - Quarterly reports
  - 15 page final research project – Draft due: May 14, 2021

## Application Process

- Complete application packet on the ARDRAW website
- Application packet includes
  - An abstract and research proposal (5 pages)
  - Proof of access to data
  - IRB approval and timeframe
  - A resume or CV
  - Two letters of recommendation emailed directly to ardraw@policyresearchinc.org
- Submit by February 28, 2020
- Notification by May 1, 2020

## Selection Criteria

- Detailed description in the RFA
- First level of review
  - Completeness of the application packet
  - Relevance to the ARDRAW research objectives
- Second level
  - Review by ARDRAW Project Coordinator
  - May provide feedback on suggested improvements to proposal before “official” review
- Third level
  - Review by a panel of researchers and the Social Security Administration

## You're selected! What's next?

- You will have 1 month to submit a detailed Work Plan (by June 1)
- Upon approval of your Work Plan, you will receive the first installment of your award (\$5,000)
- The following month you will have your first in a series of calls with PRI staff, you and your mentor. These quarterly calls occur in August, November, February, and May.
- Upon successful submission of your final paper, you will receive the second installment of your award (\$5,000)

## Research Stipend FAQs

- Is there a budget or reporting required?
  - No
- Can my university accept the stipend payment directly and apply it to my account?
  - Yes
- If it is a group project, will both of us get a stipend?
  - No, one representative of the team will receive the payment.
- Can I pay participants in my research project with the stipend funds?
  - Yes

## Tips for Success

- Topics that are relevant
- Basic understanding of SSA programs
- Research that is feasible
  - Can be completed in a year
  - Enough participants
  - Access to data
  - Factor in time for IRB review

- Make sure you can explain how your research topic/product can inform SSA policy
- Know the current state of the literature around your topic
- Get to know the disability benefit application and receipt/management process
- Take feedback you receive on your application into consideration
- Front-load your work in the workplan
- Apply for your IRB as soon as possible

- Network!
- Keep ARDRAW posted with your progress
- Apply for a second grant!
- Consider your publishing/dissemination goals

## Application Tips

- Think outside the box!
- Will the answers to your research questions lead to policy recommendations?
- Look at which areas are lacking research or data
- Ask for feedback on your proposal from people who work for disability service organizations

## General Tips

- Build a list of contacts to disseminate your survey/recruiting materials
- Think through potential recruiting problems and strategies for adapting
- Check the accessibility of any survey instruments
- Consider offering an incentive to attract participants
- Develop a detailed timeline with plenty of wiggle room
- Create a budget and keep track of all expenses
- Take advantage of professional development opportunities

# SSA's Disability Programs and Work Incentives

## SSA has two different disability programs.

- Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) provides benefits to disabled or blind people who are “insured” by workers’ contributions to the SSA trust fund.
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI) makes cash assistance payments to the aged, blind and disabled who have limited income and assets.

## SSA's Definition of Disability

The inability to engage in **ANY** substantial gainful activity because of a medically determinable impairment:

- That is expected to result in death, or
- That has lasted or is expected to last for a period of 12 continuous months.

## Definition of Substantial Gainful Activity (SGA)

- SGA is work activity either as an employee or a self-employed person
- It is used as a guideline to determine initial and continuing disability entitlement for SSDI beneficiaries and initial entitlement for SSI recipients.
- Monthly amounts for 2020
  - \$1,260: Non-blind
  - \$2,110: Blind

## Work Incentives

- Work Incentives are SSA rules that help beneficiaries keep their benefits as they explore work.
  - For SSDI recipients, work incentives provide opportunities for beneficiaries to make money that exceeds SGA, gain new skills, and achieve greater independence through work without losing access to valuable benefits.
  - For SSI recipients, the more income an individual has, the lower his or her benefit will be – but work incentives include some exclusions that help the individual keep a higher benefit payment.

## Work Expenses

- Impairment Related Work Expenses
  - The cost of certain disability-related items and services that a person needs in order to work can be deducted from earnings in determining substantial gainful activity for SSDI and excluded from earned income in determining the SSI monthly payment amount.
- Blind Work Expenses
  - The cost of ordinary and necessary work-related expenses may be deducted from countable earned income.

## Trial Work Period

- Trial Work Period
  - Nine calendar months during which work will not be used to determine if disability has ceased
- Extended Period of Eligibility
  - After the Trial Work Period is exhausted, if individual continues to make over SGA, benefits are suspended (rather than terminated) for the next 36 months
  - If earnings fall below SGA during 36 months, benefits can be reinstated without reapplication

## For Beneficiaries Who Successfully Return to Work and Transition Off Benefits

- Continuation of Medicare Coverage
  - Medicare coverage continues for at least 93 months after the TWP. Part A is premium-free.
  - Medicare for the Working Disabled can be used beyond the 93 months, however, Part A is no longer premium-free.
- Expedited Reinstatement
  - For people who successfully return to work and lose their entitlement to SSDI or SSI benefits, but work stops within 5 years of when benefits ended
  - Allows up to 6 months of temporary cash benefits

## Income Exclusions

- Earned income exclusion
  - \$65 plus 1/2 of the remaining monthly earned income (wages or self-employment) is excluded from countable income to provide an incentive for SSI recipients to work
- Student Earned Income Exclusion
  - SSI student (under age 22) regularly attending school may exclude earned income up to \$1870/month, up to \$7,550 a calendar year (for 2019)
- Plan to Achieve Self Support
  - Allows beneficiaries to set aside wages or other income besides SSI and/or resources to pursue a work goal (e.g., education, vocational training, etc.) assistive technology used for employment-related purposes, or starting a business. Money set aside under PASS does not count when the SSI payment amount is calculated.
